with all of you!





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Roots of Orthodoxy in Syria and the Lives of Saints Ephraim the Syrian and Isaac the Syrian

As we gather in worship on this blessed day (1/28), we commemorate two revered saints in the Orthodox Christian tradition—Saint Ephraim the Syrian and Saint Isaac the Syrian. Their lives and teachings are intricately woven into the rich tapestry of Orthodoxy. They come from Syria, a land with a spiritual heritage that dates back to biblical times. To understand the roots of their faith in Christ, let us journey back to Nineveh and the prophet Jonah, laying the foundation for the profound influence of Syrian Christianity.

Long before the birth of Christ, the city of Nineveh stood as a powerful Assyrian capital. It was here that the reluctant prophet Jonah received his divine calling to proclaim repentance to the Assyrians. The people of Nineveh heeded Jonah's warning, repenting and turning to the Lord. But give to me Your servant the spirit of purity, humility, patience, and love. Yes Lord and King grant me to see my own sins and not to judge mt brother. For blessed are You forever and ever. Amen!"


Saint Isaac, born in Qatar in the 7th century, embraced a life of asceticism and solitude. He, along with his brother, withdrew to the renowned monastery in Nineveh, dedicating themselves to a life of prayer and contemplation on the mysteries of Christ. It was in this monastic setting that Saint Isaac's spiritual insights deepened, and his teachings on divine love and compassion took root.

Eventually, Saint Isaac's humility and wisdom led him to be appointed as the bishop of Nineveh, where he continued to guide the faithful with his profound spirituality. His mystical writings, often emphasizing the

transformative power of prayer and contemplation on the Mysteries, continue to resonate with believers, providing a timeless roadmap for those on the path to spiritual growth and a life in Christ.

On this day, we honor and commemorate the lives of Saint Ephraim the Syrian and Saint Isaac the Syrian, whose contributions and holy lives have enriched our Orthodox tradition. As we partake in the divine services and reflect on their teachings, let us draw inspiration from their devotion, seeking to emulate their steadfast faith and love for Christ.




