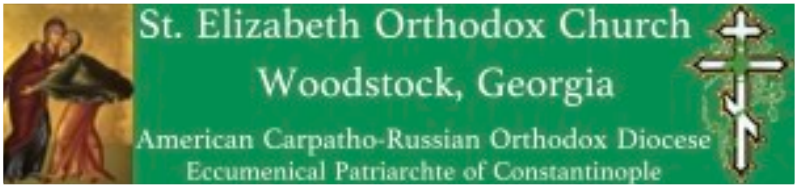
### Christ is Among us!

## **GREAT LENT 2024**

Protocol No. 3/2024

My beloved Faithful Clergy and Laity (Young and Old) of our God-Protected Diocese:

As we begin Holy and Great Lent this year on March 18th, I want to share with you a few thoughts so that we may journey through this reflective period and arrive at the Great Feast of Feasts, PASCHA to receive the Resurrected Christ.

We are reminded that there can be no true fast, no genuine repentance, no reconciliation with God, unless we at the same time reconcile with one another. In this holiest period of the ecclesiastical year, we should honestly examine our relationships with our families, our Church families, friends, neighbors, co-workers, and the society in general.

After all, a fast without mutual love and forgiveness is “the fast of demons”. Part of our salvation in our daily lives is the practicing of forgiveness and love. Forgiveness is truly a glimpse of the Heavenly Kingdom in our sinful and fallen world. Only with God’s grace and a repentant heart can we truly return to unity, love, and harmony.

Great Lent involves hard work: on ourselves, our thoughts and feelings, our relationships with those around us. Our Lenten discipline of fasting, prayer, and charity is given to us not as a burden or hardship, but rather as an opportunity for restoring our relationship with God the Father, Jesus Christ the Son, The Holy Spirit, the Theotokos, our Guardian Angel, our Patron Saint, our neighbors and even ourselves. The Church invites us to transform our lives and to receive abundantly both peace and joy. Great Lent is an opportunity to renew our souls, minds, and bodies by entering more fully into a Christ-like life.

Therefore as we begin our Lenten journey together, I am asking for your forgiveness for any offenses I may have caused you. Let us pray for each other so that on that day of PASCHA, the Feast of Feasts, we may sing with loud voices the beautiful Hymn of the Resurrection.

I pray that this Great Lenten Season is a spiritually uplifting experience for all of us.

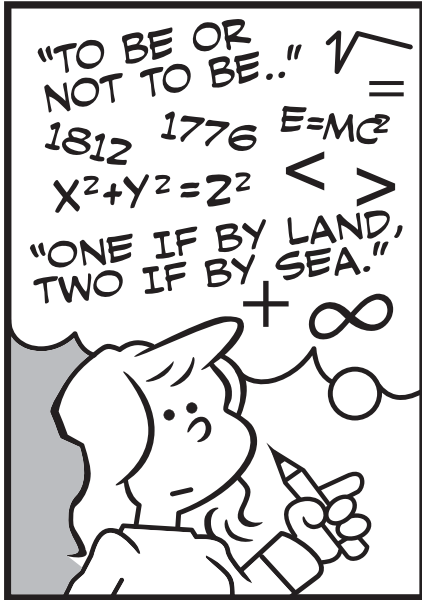

Dear Parish Family of Saint Elizabeth Orthodox Church,

Dear Beloved Parish Family,

Today as we begin great Lent, remember the importance of forgiveness. Just as we humbly ask for God's forgiveness, so too must we extend forgiveness to our fellow brothers and sisters. Let love and reconciliation permeate our interactions, showing us the mercy and compassion of our Lord.

As we journey through Lent, dedicate yourselves more fully to the life of the Church. Attend the divine services as frequently as possible, cherishing each opportunity to partake in the Sacraments and receive the Grace of God. Lent is a time to care for our church, both physically and spiritually, as a tangible expression of our love and devotion to Christ.

As family in Christ, approach this Lenten season with eager anticipation, hope, joy, and unwavering commitment. Spring is the season of new life, and so too Lent can be a time of spiritual renewal and transformation for each of us if we take it seriously. Don't delay your repentance or wait until Good Friday to seek the healing grace of Confession. The acceptable time to grow in our faith is now, in this moment.

Remember, that life is a precious gift bestowed upon us by our gracious God. Don't squander it in pursuit of earthly cares, but instead, choose Christ as the center of your life. May this Lenten journey be one of profound spiritual awakening and renewal, leading us ever closer to the embrace of our loving and merciful Savior.

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## What is Forgiveness Sunday?

Forgiveness Sunday comes to us each year on the last Sunday before Great Lent begins. This opportunity is once again laid before us to begin Lent the right way. With the Grace of forgiveness. Today we are reminded of God's infinite mercy and encouraged to begin our Lenten journey by receiving and offering forgiveness to each other, just as God mercifully gives it to us. Forgiveness Sunday is a reminder that we cannot grow in the spiritual life, we cannot make movement towards Christ, holiness, and salvation without forgiveness and humility. Christ is our Chief Cornerstone. He shows us by His own example what humility and forgiveness look like from the very heights of the cross. Without forgiveness and humility, we cannot become like Him.



This is a special day in the Orthodox Church. It marks the beginning of the season of Great Lent. Lent is a time set aside for Orthodox Christian to prepare for Holy Week and our Lord's Resurrection by growing closer to God, changing, and growing in God's likeness by His Grace. During this time we use the tools of fasting, prayer, repentance, and an increased commitment to the life of the Church to assist us as we move closer and closer to the Cross.

Forgiveness Sunday is an ancient tradition of the Christian Church. In the Gospel of Matthew, Jesus teaches his disciples to forgive others: "For if you forgive men their trespasses, your heavenly Father will also forgive you" (Matt. 6:14). The lessons of the early Church and the wisdom of the Church Fathers provides us with many powerful examples of the importance of forgiveness and its eternal consequences.

On Forgiveness Sunday the Church celebrates a ceremony of mutual forgiveness, where the clergy and the faithful ask each other for forgiveness. This public act of forgiveness has the potential to be such a powerful moment of mercy, humility, and reconciliation for the community. It is a reminder that we are all sinners, and that we all need forgiveness. In the words of St. John Chrysostom, "If we forgive our neighbors, we will be forgiven by God; if we refuse to forgive, we will be condemned by God." This reminder is so important for us to hear as we prepare to begin the season of Great Lent, hopefully with a clean slate.

The Church Fathers wrote extensively about forgiveness and repentance, and their teachings continue to inspire and guide us today. St. Basil the Great emphasized the importance of forgiveness in his homily on Forgiveness Sunday: "Let us forgive one another's sins, for this is the reason we are here. Let us love one another, for love comes from God. Let us be patient with one another, for we are all struggling towards the same goal."

St. Cyril of Alexandria wrote about the need for humility in forgiveness: "True humility is the foundation of forgiveness. Only the humble are capable of forgiving others, for they recognize their own faults and weaknesses." St. Isaac the Syrian, another prominent Church Father, wrote in one of his homilies that: "Forgiveness is the renewal of love. Forgiveness is the beauty of holiness. Forgiveness is the life of the soul. Forgiveness is the medicine that heals the wounds of sin."

As we enter the season of Great Lent, let us reflect on these teachings and renew our commitment to forgiveness and repentance. Let us seek forgiveness from those whom we have wronged and forgive those who have wronged us. Let us be patient with one another, for we are all struggling towards the same goal; salvation and life in Christ. In this season of Lent, as in all of life, we are called to be patient and merciful with others just as God is patient and merciful with us.

Forgiveness is not so much a duty, but a gift. Through forgiveness, we are liberated from the burden of our sins; we are healed and allowed to start anew. It is a gift that we can freely offer to others, just as we freely receive it from God.

In the words of St. John Climacus, "Forgiveness is the remission of sins. For it is by this that what has been lost, and was found, is saved from being lost again." So let us embrace forgiveness and humility on this Forgiveness Sunday and throughout the season of Great Lent. Let us strive to grow closer to God and to one another, and let us remember that through forgiveness, we can be healed and made whole. We can become the holy people whom God Himself created us to be.

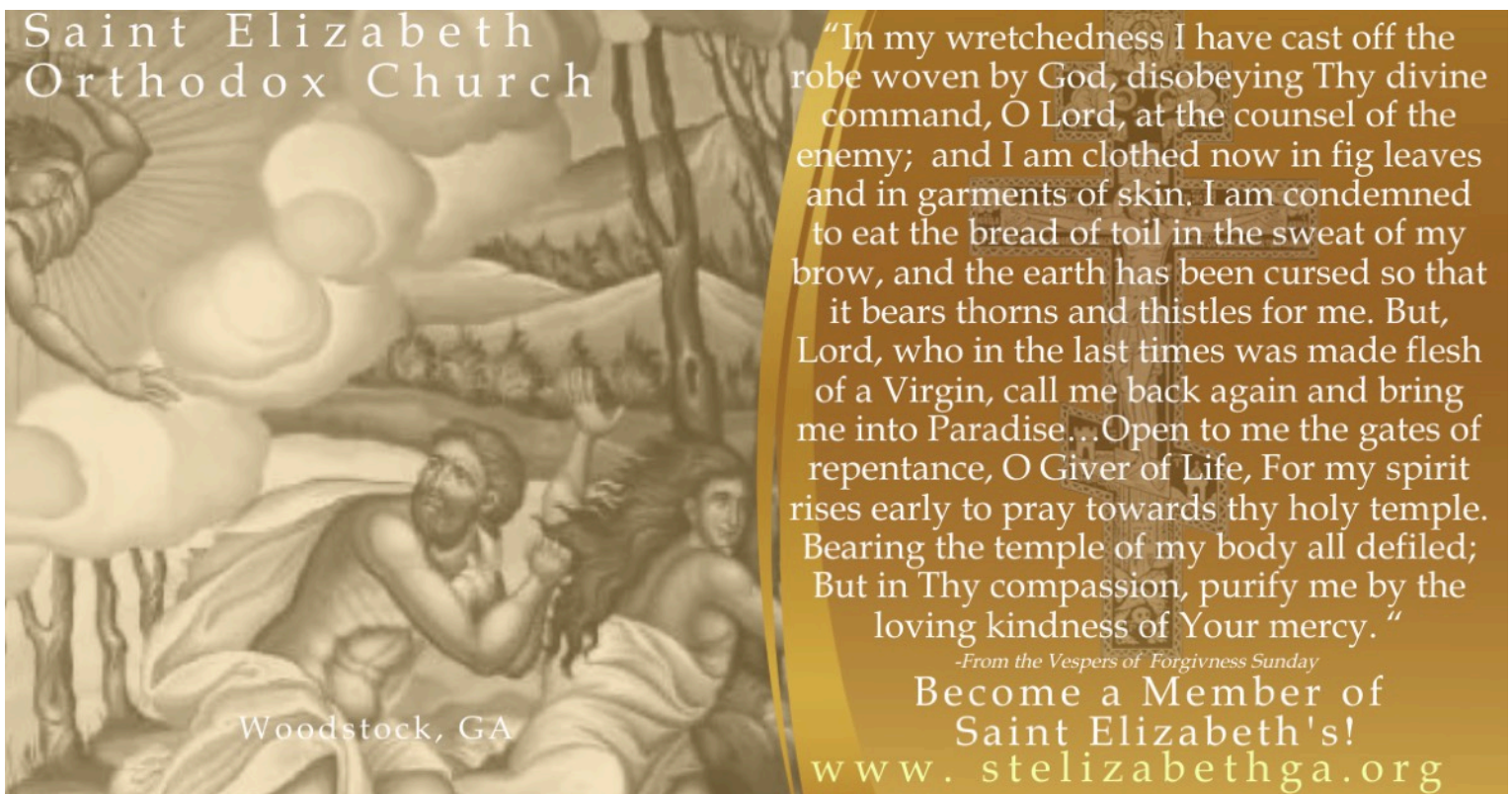
