




BUT CAN YOU CARRY ONE?

Sunday of the Holy, Precious, and Life Giving Cross

The third Sunday of Lent marks a significant milestone on our Lenten journey. It's a day dedicated to the veneration of the precious and life-giving Cross of our Lord, reminding us of the sacrifice that Christ made for us and encouraging us to continue on the path of repentance towards the resurrection.

As we reach the midway point of Lent, it can be a time when we begin to struggle, especially if we've increased prayer, fasting, attending Church services, made a good confession, or utilized any of the other tools provided by the Church. If Lent feels challenging, the Cross becomes a symbol to redouble our efforts and persevere on the path of repentance towards the life-giving Cross. If Lent feels easy or if we haven't made much progress on our Lenten journey, the Cross still provides a powerful message. The Cross a signpost that points towards the foot of the Cross, where we have the opportunity to lay aside our sins, choose to repent, take up our Cross, and follow after Christ. The Cross reminds us of the hope and joy that we have in Him and serves as a compass, guiding us towards eternal life.

In a world full of distractions and sinful habits that only lead us further into the darkness, the Cross serves as a



beacon of light, illuminating the way towards salvation. As St. Cyril of Jerusalem wrote, "The Cross is a sign of victory and a trophy of salvation. It is the means by which the devil was defeated and death was destroyed." The Cross is a sign of guidance for the lost, a reminder that we need to keep our eyes fixed on Christ and His sacrifice, rather than being led astray by the temptations of the world. As we journey through Lent, make sure to keep your eyes fixed on the prize of the Cross and the "trophy of salvation".

The Cross was not always seen as a symbol of hope and victory. In fact, it was originally a means of the most horrific and humiliating execution. The Cross symbolized all the horrors of death. Christ transformed the Cross into a symbol of life and hope by His life-giving death. Christ's victory over sin and death on the Cross gave new meaning to this once-symbol of shame and humiliation. Now, the Cross is a tangible symbol of the love that God has for us and the hope that we have in Christ. "O Lord…protect your people by Your Cross!"

The Cross is a reminder that no matter how lost we may feel, there is always hope in Christ and that through His sacrifice on the Cross, we can be redeemed and find our way back to the light. The Cross is a signpost on the road to paradise. It points us in the direction of eternal life, guiding us towards the Kingdom of God. It reminds us that the path to salvation is not always easy, but it is worth it. The Cross encourages us to persevere in our spiritual journey, even when the road ahead is difficult.

So, how can we apply these reminders to our daily lives during Lent?

- 1. Focus on the hope of the resurrection: During Lent, we are called to repent and to turn away from our sins. However, we should also focus on the hope of the resurrection, and the joy that we will experience when we are united with Christ. Try reading the Bible every day and reflecting on the promises of eternal life.
- 2. Pray for guidance: The Cross serves as a compass, pointing us in the direction of eternal life. We can pray for guidance as we journey through Lent, asking God to help us stay on the right path and to avoid temptation.
- 3. Seek the support of others: We do not have to journey through Lent alone. We can seek the support of our priest and our Church Family. We can encourage one another in our spiritual journey and offer support and guidance when needed.
- 4. Practice self-reflection: Lent is a time for self-reflection and introspection. We can use this time to examine our lives and to identify areas where we need to grow and change. If we are always talking, we can't listen for the voice of God calling to us. Be quite, be still, and look upon the Cross.


St. Ignatius of Antioch, a 1st century bishop who wrote these words on his way to martyrdom said, "The Cross is the way that leads to the kingdom." These words ring just as true today as they ever have! The Cross continues to guide us towards the ultimate destination of our spiritual journey - the kingdom of God. It is a reminder that the path to salvation is not an easy one, but it is a path that we must follow if we are to be united with Christ.

The Cross is like a signpost, guiding us through Lent and through life, pointing us towards the Resurrection. As St. John Chrysostom wrote, "The Cross is a sign of victory over the devil, a sign of protection for the faithful, and a sign of guidance for the lost." May we always look to the Cross as a symbol of hope and redemption, and may we be guided by its light towards the kingdom of God and the joys of Pascha!






