

His Grace Neophytos Kong'ai, Bishop of Eldoret and Northern Kenya



Born in 1970 in the village of Kesengei in the Nandi district in Kenya. He is a graduate of the "Archbishop Makarios III" Patriarchal Academy. He was ordained Deacon on September 13, 1998 and Presbyter on the 27th of the same month by the then Metropolitan of Kenya, now of Zimbabwe and Angola, His Eminence Seraphim. He served in Parishes in Nairobi and at the Patriarchal Academy there as Deputy Head. On February 27, 2005 he was consecrated as Archimandrite by His Eminence Makarios Metropolitan of Kenya. In the same year he was awarded a post graduate degree in Theological Studies by the Holy Cross Academy in Boston. In 2007 he was tonsured a Monk at the Holy Monastery of the Transfiguration in Verroea. He is a doctoral candidate in Pastoral Theology, studying at the Aristoteleian University of Thessaloniki.

On November 26, 2014, by proposal of His Beatitude, he was elected by the Holy Synod as Auxiliary Bishop of Nitria, and ordained by His Beatitude Theodoros II Pope and Patriarch of Alexandria on December 21, 2014 at the Patriarchal Church of St Savvas the Sanctified.

On November 24, 2015, proposed by His Beatitude, he was elected by the Holy Synod of the Patriarchate of Alexandria as Bishop of the newly-established Diocese of Nieri and Mount Kenya. On 24th November 2023, he was elected by the Holy Synod as Bishop of Eldoret and Northern Kenya.

Bishop Kongai devotes most of his time to ministering to children and families in need. He has helped build an Orthodox primary academy (St. Nicholas Academy), a medical clinic (St. Luke), and the Parish Church of St. Anthimos. He has said that more work needs to be done. As a bishop of a young diocese, Bishop Kongai said they are doing fine, but have many needs, which he wanted to explain while on his visit here in hopes of receiving help, as well as spreading faith. "We need to put systems in place. We need to build churches. We need to help the poor. We need to educate the needy children who don't have means of going to school," he said. The Diocese spans some 50,250 square miles and is comprised of 60 parishes that are served by 53 priests.

Since he has been enthroned, some of his accomplishments in his dioceses has been: renovated 10 churches; built 11 semi-permanent churches; built 2 permanent churches; provided motorcycles to 53 clergy (to be able to visit and minister to those in need far from their churches); built and opened the Diocese Centre 2018; built a hall to accommodate 100 people; and sponsored many students from primary, secondary and tertiary education levels. However, the MOST AMAZING ongoing accomplishment is HE FEEDS 100 CHILDREN EACH DAY and they call him 'their papa.'

ORTHODOXY IN KENYA



The Orthodox Church in Kenya was established from the beginning of this century. First Greek emigrants brought the Orthodox faith to this country and then the Africans themselves discovered it and have embraced it since 1930.

The people of Kenya were officially accepted under the jurisdiction of the Patriarchate of Alexandria in 1946 and since then there has been a close relationship with the Apostolic See of St. Mark. Through the Patriarchate of Alexandria the Orthodox African people of Kenya are recognised internationally.

During the emergency period the Orthodox Church of Kenya played a leading part in the struggle for the Independence of the country. The Mau Mau movement had many leaders from the Orthodox faithful especially in Kiambu. It was during this time that Orthodox Schools and Churches were closed by the colonial government and

many Orthodox priests were imprisoned. In 1958, because of the rapid development of the Orthodox faith in East Africa, a Metropolitan was appointed to care for the Spiritual needs of the three East African countries. The name which was given by the Holy Synod of the Patriarchate of Alexandria was the Holy Archbishopric of Irinoupolis which means the "City of Peace".

The late Archbishop and President of Cyprus Makarios III, a leading personality in the fight for the independence of his country was closely associated with the President and leader of the independence movement of Kenya, Mzee Jomo Kenyatta. Archbishop Makarios of Cyprus, on the invitation of the Mzee Kenyatta visited Kenya and was given the warm welcome of a national hero. His love for the African Orthodox people of Kenya is evident through the construction of a Technical School and a Theological Seminary for the education of the African people.





The African Orthodox people of Kenya owe their spiritual growth in the Orthodox faith to the great generosity of the late Archbishop Makarios. The Orthodox Patriarchal Seminary today serves not only the needs of the people of East Africa but of Western Africa also.

The African Orthodox Church of Kenya under the canonical jurisdiction of the Holy Archbishopric of Irinoupolis is the only legitimate Church in the country. Today through the generosity of the Orthodox people from abroad (Greece, Finland, America, Cyprus) the

Orthodox Church in Kenya is making a great contribution to the social, economic and educational development of the country, Many Secondary Schools, Clinics, Nursery Schools and hospitals are to be found throughout the country and hundreds of Scholarships are given to children of Kenya for their educational needs. The number of Orthodox faithful in Kenya is increasing daily.



Tropar Tone 2: We venerate Your most pure image, O Good One,* and ask forgiveness for our transgressions, O Christ our God.* For You, of Your Good will, were pleased to ascend the Cross in the flesh,* to deliver Your creatures from the bond of the enemy.* Therefore with thankfulness we cry aloud to You,* "O Saviour by Your coming to save the world, You have filled all with joy."
