



# 3rd Sunday of Lent: The Sunday of the Holy Cross

"Seeing the Precious Cross of Christ placed before us this day, let us venerate it and rejoice in faith; with love let us greet the Lord who by his own free choice was crucified upon it, asking Him to grant us all uncondemned to adore His Holy Passion and to attain the Resurrection" - From a Matins Hymn on Veneration of the Cross Sunday



The Third Sunday of the Great Fast is that of the Veneration of the Cross. The cross stands in the midst of the church in the middle of the lenten season not merely to remind men of Christ's redemption and to keep before them the goal of their efforts, but also to be venerated as that reality by which man must live to be saved. "He who does not take up his cross and follow me is not worthy of me" (Mt 10.38). For in the Cross of Christ Crucified lies both "the power of God and the wisdom of God" for those being saved (1 Cor 1.24).

Dear Parish Family Saint Elizabeth Orthodox Church,

As we journey through the Lenten season, reflecting on the eternal significance of the cross and the empty tomb of our Lord, we are called to remember God's blessings freely bestowed upon us as a growing Orthodox Christian family. It is also important to acknowledge the work of past and present parishioners whose stewardship and generosity have built the foundation upon which we stand today. Your ongoing support is essential as we continue to grow as an Orthodox Christian family and embark on various capital building projects and kitchen upgrades essential for the growth and vitality of our community.

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As I was packing up my office to move down the hall, I rediscovered some items from our Church's early days. Next to my filing cabinet was poster board of special pledges made by parishioners towards the building fund, which was established to erect a permanent Church building. The generosity of our founders is a testament to their faith in Christ and commitment to build an Orthodox Christian Church in the Woodstock area.

Today, as we continue to carry our cross and build up God's House, I humbly ask you this Lent to prayerfully consider making a special contribution towards the renovation of our Church Hall, building fund, the burning of our mortgage, or any other project that resonates with your heart. The Church remembers forever the founders, builders, and benefactors of the Church in the Great Entrance during the Divine Liturgy. Contributing to this campaign makes you a builder and a benefactor of God's House here at Saint Elizabeth Orthodox Church. That means that the Church will remember you and pray for you forever in her holy prayers.






# **Sunday of the Holy, Precious, and Life Giving Cross**

The third Sunday of Lent marks a significant milestone on our Lenten journey. It's a day dedicated to the veneration of the precious and life-giving Cross of our Lord, reminding us of the sacrifice that Christ made for us and encouraging us to continue on the path of repentance towards the resurrection. The cross is our strength.

As we reach the midway point of Lent, it can be a time when we begin to struggle, especially if we've increased prayer, fasting, attending Church services, made a good confession, or utilized any of the other tools provided by the Church. If Lent feels challenging, the Cross becomes a symbol to redouble our efforts and persevere on the path of repentance towards Christ and the life-giving Cross.

If Lent feels easy or if we haven't made much progress on our Lenten journey, the Cross still provides a powerful message. The Cross a signpost that points towards the foot of the Cross, where we have the opportunity to lay



aside our sins, choose to repent, take up our Cross, and follow after Christ. The Cross is heavy but yet reminds us of the hope and joy that we have in Christ and serves as a compass, guiding us towards eternal life.

In a world full of distractions and sinful habits that only lead us further into the darkness, the Cross serves as a beacon of light, illuminating the way towards salvation. As St. Cyril of Jerusalem wrote, "The Cross is a sign of victory and a trophy of salvation. It is the means by which the devil was defeated and death was destroyed." The Cross is a sign of guidance for the lost, a reminder that we need to keep our eyes fixed on Christ and His sacrifice, rather than being led astray by the temptations of the world. As we journey through Lent, make sure to keep your eyes fixed on the prize of the Cross and the "trophy of salvation".

The Cross was not always seen as a symbol of hope and victory. In fact, it was originally a means of the most horrific and humiliating execution. The Cross symbolized all the horrors of death. Christ transformed the Cross into a symbol of life and hope by His life-giving death. Christ's victory over sin and death on the Cross gave new meaning to this once-symbol of shame and humiliation. Now, the Cross is a tangible symbol of the love that God has for us and the hope that we have in Christ. "O Lord…protect your people by Your Cross!"

The Cross is a reminder that no matter how lost we may feel, there is always hope in Christ and that through His sacrifice on the Cross, we can be redeemed and find our way back to the light. The Cross is a signpost on the road to paradise. It points us in the direction of eternal life, guiding us towards the Kingdom of God. It reminds us that the path to salvation is not always easy, but it is worth it. The Cross encourages us to persevere in our spiritual journey, even when the road ahead is difficult.

### Sunday of the Holy, Precious, and Life Giving Cross Continued

So, how can we apply these reminders to our daily lives during Lent?

- Focus on the hope of the resurrection: During Lent, we are called to repent and to turn away from our sins. However, we should also focus on the hope of the resurrection, and the joy that we will experience when we are united with Christ. Try reading the Bible every day and reflecting on the promises of eternal life.
- Pray for guidance and let God be your strength: The Cross serves as a compass, pointing 2. us in the direction of eternal life. We can pray for guidance and strength as we journey through Lent, asking God to help us stay on the right path and to avoid temptation. Christ is strong on the Cross. He pours out everything for us and our salvation. Ask Him for strength to bear the burdens of life and to come into communion with Him as we strungle to carry our own crosses.
- Seek the support of others: We do not have to journey through Lent alone. We can seek 3. the support of our priest and our Church Family. We can encourage one another in our spiritual journey and offer support and guidance when needed. Think about Simon of Cyrene who helps Christ carry His Cross to Golgotha. Seek for help and be a helper!
- Practice self-reflection: Lent is a time for self-reflection and introspection. We can use this 4. time to examine our lives and to identify areas where we need to grow and change. If we are always talking, we can't listen for the voice of God calling to us. Be guite, be still, and look upon the Cross.

St. Ignatius of Antioch, a 1st century bishop who wrote these words on his way to martyrdom said, "The Cross is the way that leads to the kingdom." These words ring just as true today as they ever have! The Cross continues to guide us towards the ultimate destination of our spiritual journey - the kingdom of God. It is a reminder that the path to salvation is not an easy one, but it is a path that we must follow if we are to be united with Christ.

The Cross is like a signpost, guiding us through Lent and through life, pointing us towards the



### Preparing for Chrismation/Conversion in the Orthodox Church

Chrismation is the name given in Eastern Orthodox Churches to the sacrament known as confirmation in the Roman Catholic Church. It is so called because of the holy oil, or chrism, which has been consecrated by the Patriarch of Constantinople and with which the recipient of the sacrament is anointed, as the priest speaks the words, "the seal of the gift of the Holy Spirit."

As with Baptism, the catechumen must select a godparent to sponsor them.



The sponsor must be an Orthodox Christian in good standing with the Church sacramentally. Most importantly, the sponsor should be a faithful Christian and good example of Orthodox Christian behavior. The relationship that is created through sponsorship is a lifelong relationship and one that should benefit the new Orthodox Christian.

It is traditional, although it is not absolutely necessary, that the sponsor purchase an cross necklace to be blessed by the priest and worn around the neck after the sacrament. Together with the catechumen, the sponsor will recite the Nicene Creed during the ceremony, a sign of his/her own belief in the faith of the Church. The recipient of the Mystery should wear white or bright clothing if possible.

#### The Sacrament of Chrismation

All Orthodox Christians are required to receive the sacrament of Chrismation. "Cradle" Orthodox Christians receive the sacrament immediately after they are baptized, usually as infants. For those coming into the Orthodox Church later in life, a person originally baptized according the Trinitarian formula (Father, Son and Holy Spirit) would receive the sacrament of Chrismation alone and would not need to be rebaptized.

The sacrament, as it applies to adult converts, consists of a number of prayers and hymns, all of which are also used during the Baptism Service. The conferring of the grace of God through the sacrament takes place as the priest anoints the forehead, chin, ears, and hands of the newly baptized with chrism. In Holy Chrismation the whole person is consecrated to God and made to be a dwelling place, or home for the Holy Spirit.

The catechumen (the person who has studied the faith) is expected to recite the Nicene Creed as an indication of their acceptance of the Orthodox faith and doctrines. Through Chrismation a person is given the "power from on high" (Acts 12), the gift of the Spirit of God, in order to live the new life received in baptism. He is anointed, just as Christ the Messiah is the Anointed One of God. He becomes, as the Fathers of the Church dared to put it, a "christ" together with Jesus. Thus, through Chrismation we become an anointed child of God and follower of Jesus Christ. We could also say that we become a person upon whom the Holy Spirit dwells, a person in whom the Holy Spirit lives and acts as long as we want Him and cooperate with His powerful and holy inspiration.

After receiving Chrismation, the recipient is eligible to receive the Eucharist (Holy Communion). The Eucharist binds us more perfectly to the Church, and enriches us with a special strength of the Holy Spirit.
