Did you know that each and every member of our church family is commemorated (remembered) during the Proskomedia? This sacred service of preparation before the beginning of the Divine Liturgy involves the offering of particles of bread to God for Holy Communion, representing the entire Church. We invite you to actively participate in this prayerful tradition by submitting sheets of paper (available in the Narthex) with the names of living and departed loved ones that you would like remembered in prayer during the Liturgy.

By including the names of our loved ones, we acknowledge their presence within the community of God's Church and seek His blessings and intercession on their behalf. In the Proskomedia we are all remembered on one common plate, *the discos*, and placed next to our Lord, His Mother, the Saints, the Angels, the Martyrs, and the whole community of the Church both living and departed.


In the Proskomedia we are offering the very best of ourselves to the Lord and asking that He remember us always in His Kingdom. This is a beautiful way to care for one another spiritually and foster unity among our church family, as all of us stand together next to our Lord along with our loved ones on *the discos*.

Everyone is invited to write down the names of those who are living and those who have departed and give them to Fr.

Matthew.

Through this act of remembrance, we unite and lift up our hearts and souls in worship before the Altar of our God. As we come together to celebrate the Divine Liturgy, the offering of these names is a reminder of the love and spiritual support we offer to one another.

St. Elizabeth Orthodox Church Woodstock, GA Remembering the Fathers of the First Six Ecumenical Councils

Within the Orthodox Christian Tradition, the remembrance of the Fathers of the first six Ecumenical Councils is celebrated on a Sunday in the middle of July. This commemoration provides an opportunity for the faithful to honor and reflect upon the contributions of these holy men who valiantly defended the Orthodox Faith against heresy.

At every Divine Liturgy we sing the hymn, "We have seen the true light, we have received the Heavenly Spirit, we found the true faith, we adore the Undivided Holy Trinity, Who has saved us!" We are able to sing this hymn with joy because the faith of the Apostles that these Holy Fathers of the first Six Ecumenical Councils preserved to be passed down at all of us.

Throughout the early centuries of Christianity, numerous heresies threatened to distort the fullness of the Orthodox Faith. The Church Fathers, inspired by the teachings of the Apostles and guided by the Holy Spirit, convened in Ecumenical Councils to address these challenges and preserve the fullness of the faith. These Holy Fathers sought to safeguard the authenticity and integrity of the Orthodox Christian faith, ensuring that future generations would continue to have access to the true light of Christ's teachings.



The First Ecumenical Council, held in Nicaea in 325 AD, was a response to the

Arian heresy. Led by St. Athanasius and St. Nicholas, the council affirmed the divinity of Christ, countering the notion that Jesus was a created being. The formulation of the Nicene Creed during this council has stood as a pillar of the Orthodox Faith to this day.

The Second Ecumenical Council, held in Constantinople in 381 AD, confronted the heresy of Macedonianism, which denied the divinity of the Holy Spirit. The council affirmed the consubstantiality of the Holy Spirit with the Father and the Son, affirming the Triune nature of God.

The Third Ecumenical Council, held in Ephesus in 431 AD, combated the Nestorian heresy. Led by St. Cyril of Alexandria, the council affirmed that the Virgin Mary is truly the Theotokos, the Birthgiver of God in the flesh, safeguarding the unity of Christ's personhood as both fully divine and fully human.

The Fourth Ecumenical Council, held in Chalcedon in 451 AD, addressed the Monophysite controversy. It defined the orthodox doctrine of the hypostatic union, affirming that Christ possesses two distinct natures, divine and human, without confusion or division.

The Fifth Ecumenical Council, held in Constantinople in 553 AD, condemned the heresy of Origenism, which distorted the teachings on the resurrection and the nature of the soul. The council reaffirmed the Church's belief in the resurrection of the body and condemned certain teachings of Origen.

The Sixth Ecumenical Council, held in Constantinople in 680-681 AD, confronted the Monothelite heresy. The council affirmed that Christ has two wills, divine and human, united in perfect harmony, preserving the integrity of Christ's human and divine nature.

The commemoration of the Fathers of the first six Ecumenical Councils serves as a reminder of the unbroken chain connecting the Orthodox faithful with the teachings of the Apostles. These holy men fought tirelessly against heresy, ensuring the preservation of the Orthodox Faith and the transmission of the true light of Christ's teachings to future generations.

As we gather together to commemorate the Fathers of the first six Ecumenical Councils the hymn, "We have seen the true light, we have received the Heavenly Spirit, we found the true faith, we adore the Undivided Holy Trinity, Who has saved us!" from the liturgy resonates in the walls of the Church with renewed significance. This hymn encapsulates the tireless efforts and the faith of the Church Fathers in defending the Orthodox Faith against heresy. Their unwavering commitment to upholding the teachings of the Apostles and preserving the fullness of the Orthodox Faith is a testament to their holiness and light for us on the narrow road of faith in Christ that leads to Paradise.

The central lesson at the day camp was on the significance of prosphora, the bread used in Holy Communion. The children discovered that "prosphora" means offering. The bread is the offering that we God for Holy Communion, but it also represents the act of giving oneself as an offering to God. Through hands-on activities, the children and their parents actively participated in baking the prosphora, further deepening their understanding and connection to the Divine Liturgy. The Phosphor

made by our children was used in this morning's Divine Liturgy.

In addition to the educational and spiritual elements, the Little Saints Day Camp offered a range of exciting activities that kept the young participants entertained and engaged throughout the day. A scavenger hunt challenged their problem-solving skills and teamwork, while the potato sack race ignited their competitive spirit. Laughter and joy filled the air as they enjoyed water balloons and the always exhilarating slip n' slide, providing refreshing relief from the Georgia summer heat.

To further foster a sense of community and togetherness, the camp attendees had the

opportunity to attend and sing the Saturday Great Vespers. The solemn and awe-inspiring service allowed the children to experience the beauty of Orthodox worship along with some rest from the heat and busyness of the day. Following the service, a delightful meal was shared with the parish family.


