NATIVITY FAST PRAYER CHALLENGE 2023

Protocol No. 9/2023

Glory to Jesus Christ!

Dear Beloved Faithful Clergy and Laity of our God-Protected Diocese,

It is hard to believe that this month marks the eleventh anniversary of my Consecration and Enthronement as your Hierarch. It has been a very strange couple of years with the arrival of the Coronavirus early in 2020. The pandemic turned our lives upside down in all aspects: physical, emotional, psychological, spiritual, social, and financial. Anxiety and despondency soared dramatically. Many of our Clergy and Laity were exposed and sickened. Unfortunately, we also lost many wonderful people of our Diocese and beyond. May their memories be eternal!

Today we see our world spinning out of control. Violence, poverty, hatred, drug overdoses, homelessness, theft and senseless killings are all increasing. We are at the brink of a World War with conflicts in Ukraine, the Holy Lands in the Middle East and other places around the planet raging. From the very beginning as God fearing people we have been praying for the Lord's help. In all of our Divine Liturgies additional petitions and prayers have been offered. And yet the struggle continues around the world. I believe we must intensify our prayers. If we are feeling like we are sinking because we are overwhelmed in our home life, work life, school life or even our social life (including social media and technology) we must be like Peter. He was walking on the water towards Jesus and when he became distracted by the winds and waves, he began to sink. Peter cried out, "Lord, save me!" (Matthew 14:30) and Jesus Christ reached down and pulled him out of the stormy sea. We too are sinking and need to cry out "Lord, save me!"

As we once again enter the Season of the Nativity Fast, I ask you, actually I plead with you, the good faithful people of our Diocese, to join me on a journey to meet the new

born King. During these 40 days leading to the Nativity of our Lord let us increase our efforts in church attendance, in prayer, in fasting, in scriptural reading, in almsgiving, in repentance and confession, in receiving the Eucharist. This is who we should be as active Orthodox Christians.

In the last eight years, I have challenged everyone, Clergy and Laity, to offer a special prayer for peace during evening prayers. The text of this prayer will be provided by the Clergy for distribution. Each household should have sufficient copies so that each young person that can read has one by their bed to use nightly and those who are too young to read may say the prayer with their parents before they go to bed. Of course, all the adults should also participate.

To assist with this challenge, a special web page has been created on the Diocesan Website, which contains downloadable texts of the special prayer. Other postings will be made on various social media outlets to encourage maximum exposure and participation.

With all of us united in prayer this Nativity Fasting Season, I am convinced that we will help to improve our lives and those of others throughout the world.

Advent Nativity Fast Season 2023

"And she gave birth to her firstborn Son and wrapped Him in swaddling clothes and laid Him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the inn." (Luke 2: 7)

In a few days we will enter into the holy season of Advent. In the Church we also refer to Advent as the Nativity Fast; the fasting period from November 15th until the celebration of the Birth of our Lord, God, and Saviour Jesus Christ on December 25th. The opportunity is once again before us come to the manger of our Lord with the shepherds and Wise Men bringing our gifts of repentance and humility as we give thanks for the greatest blessing the world will ever know. Whether you've gone through this season many times or if it's your first in the Orthodox Church, I hope this will help you get off to a good start. As always, I'm available if you need any guidance.

Advent is a season of preparation as we make ourselves ready to receive our Newborn King. If we choose to not to Monday 11/20 5:30 pm- Great Vespers: Entrance prepare ourselves by, not forgiving, not fasting, not coming to confession, not being humble, not giving to the poor, not increasing our prayer life, not reading scripture, and not loving our neighbor- then we have chosen to be like the innkeepers of Bethlehem who had no room in their inns for Mary and the Christ-child. When we neglect to prepare ourselves for the coming of Christ into the world on Christmas we choose to leave no room in the inn of our hearts for Christ to come and dwell in.

> Pretend for a moment that your soul is that very inn in Bethlehem, and your conscience is the innkeeper. Throughout the year we let all kinds of terrible visitors stay in that inn. We allow pride to come in and stay as long as he it likes. To both lust and gluttony, we give a warm bed and a free meal. We let anger in to stay for free as long as he likes. Advent is the time of year where we must evict these unwanted guests, so that when Christ knocks on the door, we can welcome Him into our hearts.

We are only able to welcome and greet Christ into our heart, soul, and mind if we first expel all those unwanted, sinful visitors.

So how do we get ready to greet Christ on Christmas? The most important thing to keep in mind is to make Advent a season of preparation as opposed to celebration. I know that this is not easy, but if we can do this, the reward on Christmas Day will only be all the more sweet. Some things we should all do are: increase the amount of time that we pray. Take time to examine your conscience so that you are able to repent and make a good Confession. Attend additional weekly Church Services and receive Holy Communion more frequently. Learn more about fasting and practice it. Increase what you give to the poor and to the church, forgive one another, practice humility, and truly love your neighbor and the stranger as our brother.

Advent Nativity Fast Season 2023

Christ came into the world to save us and allow us to become *like Him*. Take this time to forge a stronger relationship with our Saviour by taking up your Cross and becoming more transfigured in His Image.

To those who are new to fasting, fasting is an important part of Orthodox and Biblical Tradition. Fasting is a Spiritual tool which God gives to us so that we might grow closer to Him.

Fasting goes far back in the tradition of the Church. It's found throughout the Old Testament as well as the New. Moses fasted for 40 days; after which God was so pleased that he favored Moses with a most intimate conversation- this is when God gave Moses the tablets with the Ten Commandments inscribed on them. The prophet Elijah also fasted for 40 forty days. Most importantly though, Jesus Himself fasted for forty days and forty nights in the desert before He began His public ministry.

Fasting is not just a change in diet. It's a reliance on the Bread of Heaven over the bread of the earth to sustain us and give us life. It's a reminder to us that we need God more than we need food. Christ is the Life-giver, and no amount of food could ever feed us the way our Lord does. Before Christ began His public ministry, He went to prepare Himself in the desert; He did so not by fasting alone, but also with prayer. Fasting has to be more than a mere diet change. Fasting without prayer loses its meaning and purpose which is to grow closer to God. How can we grow closer to God if we don't talk with Him in prayer? With Christ as our great example, we see that we cannot separate prayer and fasting. It was through prayer and fasting together that Christ was able to resist the temptations of the Devil in the wilderness (Matthew 4:1-11) and expels the demons (Mark 9:29).


Through fasting we are saying that we trust that God is the source and provider for all things in our life. That we cannot have life without Him. It can be difficult at first, but think of it like this: The athlete, lawyer, teacher, student, or anyone who seeks a worthwhile goal is perfectly willing to make the necessary sacrifices in order to succeed. All relationships require effort, and our relationship with God is the same. Fasting is a tool for us to put focus on our relationship with Christ.

A successful fast can be gauged by one fact. The answer is not how much you abstain from, but how much you gain; how much more do you reflect Christ's Image for the world. In order to grow closer to Christ we must get off to a flying start in our Advent fast. If you're new to fasting or need some help getting into a routine, please talk with Fr. Matthew as soon as possible. Remember that the fast is for you and God and your relationship, it's personal. You need not boast nor feel shamed by how you fast compared to anyone else. God will be the one who knows your fast. This is why we must plan our fast carefully, so that we fulfill the promise we lay out before God.

Advent, like Great Lent, is a major fasting period in the Church. It is a time when we all prepare our souls for the coming of our Lord into the World. A time when we expel the unwanted guests taking residence in the inn of our souls, so that we can welcome Christ to be incarnate in each one of us.

For those who are concerned that our great American day of Thanksgiving falls during the Advent Fast, the Ecumenical Patriarch has granted us a dispensation for Thanksgiving so that we may join our loved ones in giving thanks to God for the abundant blessings bestowed upon us all.

May God bless you and be with you all. My prayer is for each of us to have a successful Advent season. Make this a season where you and your family grow closer to Christ. Fill your Christmas Day with a special kind of joy by preparing yourself; so that when the Mother of God comes knocking on our doors we, unlike the innkeepers of Bethlehem, will have room in our hearts for her Son, the Saviour of the World.




