






Zephaniah, the Prophets, & Advent

As we follow the Star of Bethlehem and travel on the sacred journey of Advent, we wait in a season of anticipation, reflection and repentance. During these days our Orthodox Church turns its gaze toward the memory of the Holy Prophet Zephaniah, whose feast we joyously celebrate on December 2. In the tapestry of prophetic voices that heralded the advent of the Messiah, Zephaniah's words stand as a beacon of hope and righteousness.

Zephaniah was the son of Cushi, a member of the tribe of Simeon who lived during the seventh century before the birth of Christ. His



prophetic ministry unfolded against the backdrop of a challenging era in the Kingdom of Judah. Idolatry and moral decay had taken root, prompting the pious King Josiah to embark on a mission of religious reform.

Zephaniah, a humble and pure soul raised in Godliness, became a fervent advocate for this reform. His words, recorded in three impactful chapters, resonate with boldness as he addresses the religious and moral corruption plaguing the Holy City of Jerusalem. He warned of the consequences of straying from the path of righteousness and called for a return to the simplicity of their forefathers.

Amidst the cries against corruption, Zephaniah's prophetic eyes looked to the future, where he foresaw the coming of the promised Messiah. In a triumphant declaration, he urged Zion to rejoice, proclaiming, "Sing, O daughter of Zion; shout, O Israel; be glad and rejoice with all your heart, O daughter of Jerusalem" (Zephaniah 3:14). His words are filled with the hope of redemption and the promise of a righteous King and Saviour.

Zephaniah envisioned a time when the gentiles would become the people of God through the Messiah. He spoke of the Messiah as the Just Judge, rewarding each according to their works. This vision echoed the broader theme of the Nativity Fasting Season – the anticipation of Christ's coming to redeem humanity.

As we observe the Nativity Fast, we are invited to draw inspiration from the life of Zephaniah and his fellow prophets. Like them, we are called to stand against the tide of moral decay, to be voices of righteousness in a world that often strays from the divine path. Zephaniah's commitment to reform and his anticipation of the Messiah's coming serve as a poignant reminder for us during this sacred season of preparation for the Incarnation of God.

In our prayers and in our daily lives, we are reminded to emulate the prophetic wisdom of Zephaniah. To seek God's guidance to discern the future, just as Zephaniah did through his humility and purity of heart. May we, like the prophets of old, anticipate the advent of the Messiah with joy and hope, preparing our hearts to receive the Christ Child in the manger of our hearts.

As we celebrate the Feast of Saint Zephaniah, let us unite in prayer, seeking the intercession of this holy prophet. May his example inspire us to be steadfast in our faith, to stand against corruption, and to eagerly await the coming Messiah. Through the grace of God, may we, like Zephaniah, be vessels of prophetic wisdom, proclaiming the good news of Christ's coming to the world on Christmas.

St. Elizabeth's Orthodox Church Traditional Christmas Eve Holy Night Supper, Christmas Eve Vigil, and Christmas Day Divine Liturgy

Please be our guests and join with the St. Elizabeth Orthodox Church family for a traditional Christian celebration of the Feast of the Nativity of our Lord. In the Orthodox Church, the forty days before Christmas

is known as the Nativity Fast, or Advent. Advent is a time of preparation for the birth of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Orthodox Christians participate in a fast from certain foods during this time of preparation which includes abstinence from meat and dairy products on most days. The fast culminates on Christmas Eve with a meat and dairy free dinner known as Holy Night Supper. At this traditional dinner, born out of the mountains of eastern Europe, the family gathers together to celebrate and give thanks for the good tidings of great joy that the birth of Christ brings into the world. All are welcome to attend a similar dinner at no cost, hosted by the St. Elizabeth Orthodox Church Parish Family starting at 4:30 pm on Christmas Eve. Since St. Elizabeth's is an international community fasting dishes from all over the world will be represented at our version of the Holy Night Supper. In the Old



World, after finishing the *Holy Supper* on Christmas Eve, the family would walk over to the Church for the celebration of the Christmas Eve Vigil, at St. Elizabeth's you will have the same opportunity to walk next door to the Church and celebrate the birth of Christ with your family. On Christmas morning the faithful will gather together once again to celebrate the Divine Liturgy, which is the central liturgical service in the Orthodox church. *Come and see* this ancient Christian celebration of the birth of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ! St. Elizabeth's is located at 2265 East Cherokee Drive in Woodstock. The dinner will begin at 4:30 PM with the Christmas Eve Vigil Service to follow at 6:30 PM. Also, please join us on Christmas morning as we celebrate the Birth of our New Born King with the traditional Orthodox Divine Liturgy at 10AM! If you have any guestions please call at 404-268-6359.
