We've completed our annual cycle of remembering, celebrating, and entering into God's plan for our salvation: the prophecies, His birth, life, death, resurrection, and ascension, the gift of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, and the sacramental presence of His body, the Ch



sacramental presence of His body, the Church. From a human perspective, we can be tempted with frustration at

times when moving from the end of something back to its beginning—doing it over again. Yet in the case of the liturgical year, we give thanks to God that we can once again joyfully celebrate His benevolence towards us. For in our finite state we need fresh starts, and this is one of them. From the culmination of Pascha, Ascension, Pentecost, and Transfiguration, we move back to the beginning events, the Nativity of the Mother of God and the Nativity of the Son of God Himself. We start this life-giving cycle over again, and the Holy Spirit, to the degree that we participate, further increases in us the sacramental realities that propel our salvation.

God, who created and loves us, knows our human frailty and our need for renewal. Marriages have their anniversaries, children their birthdays, the departed their memorials, and the saints their feasts. These are milestones of progress and sources of motivation for us, seasons of opportunity as we spiral ever upward towards heaven.

Notice that the last great feast of the closing year is the Dormition of the Virgin Mary, the Mother of God, while the first great feast of the New Year is her Nativity. Christ is the beginning and end of all things Christian. Yet the Theotokos is the chosen passage, the gate through which the incarnate Son entered into the world and opened the way of salvation for all mankind. Therefore her birth and death, that is her entire life, encapsulate the earthly life of Christ, as her womb mysteriously circumscribed Him.

The Church celebrates this day by thanking God for the spiritual and material harvests of the past year, beseeching Him for fair weather, seasonable rains, and an abundant harvest of grace and physical well-being in the year to come. This is a good time for each of us to do the same. Take a moment during personal prayers, driving in the car alone, when the kids are napping, or at any other convenient time, and thank God for what the last year offered in both blessings and challenges.

### Being a disciple of Christ in the New Church Year

The new year of the cycle of liturgical services begins in the Church on September 1<sup>st</sup>. When we think of the New Year in the secular sense, the first thing that comes to mind after fireworks and New Year's Eve celebrations is the *New Years Resolution*. As we begin the New Year in the Church, let us recommit our efforts to be disciples of Christ in the year ahead.

What does it mean to be a disciple of Christ? In order to be a disciple of Christ their are things we must let go of first. Jesus says "Follow Me" (Mt. 4:19); Christ gives the command to follow Him and the disciples follow Him immediately. They immediately drop their fishing nets and leave their old lives behind. Christ does not say, "Set all of your earthly affairs in order and then follow Me if you want", He simply commands "Follow Me." This means that the earthly cost to the disciples was immense, that there was a great sacrifice involved with following Christ.



The disciples left behind the things the world would say matter the most and in return received a reward far greater than any treasure of the earth. In the end Christ's true disciples receive the reward of eternal life in Him. With this in mind, the cost of discipleship, their earthly sacrifice, the laying aside of their earthly cares was really no sacrifice at all. They simply gave back to God all that he had given them. Christ was so compelling that His call took no preparation, no getting used to, the disciples were called and simply dove into faith and experienced it. They eagerly followed Christ and received life from the very Source of Life,


The way in which the disciples left everything behind and flocked to Christ, shows the great cost and sacrifice involved with discipleship. The disciples left behind their families, their friends, their businesses; they left their homes, and truly all they had ever known to follow Christ. To follow Christ meant letting go of all of the security, all the things they had ever known. This letting go required complete trust and commitment in Christ. For the disciples to obey Christ's command to "Follow Me" required that they must sacrifice everything to follow Christ.

We are all called to be Christ disciples. To trust Him just like his first called disciples trusted Him. To love Him like His first called disciples love Him. If we are to follow Christ then we we need to leave behind our sins and find Christ at the Cross in the Sacrament of Holy Confession. To be Christ disciple is to know Him and to know Him means that we speak with Him, Listen to Him, hear Him, and spend time with Him.

When we think about this cost of discipleship, we should all think of things that we must "sacrifice" in our lives so that we can better follow Christ. What are you holding on to that you can let go of to lighten your burden; to help you take up your cross and follow Christ?

In the year ahead work to let go of the things of this life that bind you to the world instead of Christ. Trust Him and love Him more deeply and receive the peace and blessings that only come from complete dependence on on our Lord for all things. Take up your cross and rest on the shoulders of our Lord, King, & God; Jesus Christ the Good Shepherd.

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
